
As women are the strength of our communities, we start there by working to change the story of Indigenous women from one of being a victim to one of resilience, power, hope and love.


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The Tia'm (moose) is my clan. The waving line is for water as without it, there is no life. By: Marian Nicolas

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




The Flower is for my Spirit name Mimajuaqan na wasuek – Centre Life of the flower By: Marian Nicolas

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

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


Honouring my grandmother, Mary Kate (Herney) Michael, and her unborn child, who were murdered in 1936.



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When the Europeans came to our shores we had our own government systems, laws, and spirituality. In 1610, Grand Chief Membertou converted to Catholicism. Today many Mi'kmaq have returned to our Spiritual ways. For our ancestors, a Peaked Cap was given when a girl went through the puberty Rites to become a woman. Her cap was red and when she became older it was black or dark blue. We have always adapted according to the times, now many use peaked caps at baptisms and traditional naming Ceremonies. We are still in the process of learning from our ancestors.
